# Library serves community Kingwood branch has much to offer

The Kingwood Branch Library is one of 23 branches of the Harris County Public Library System and is located at 4102 Rustic Woods Drive in the King's Crossing area of Kingwood. It is staffed by four librarians and four desk assistants, a shelver, and a custodian, all anxious to be of service.

Library cards are issued free to county residents with proof of current address. Children under 14 must have their application signed by a parent with proof of a parent's address showing. Most library materials are loaned for a two-week period. Overdue fines for books are two cents a day.

In addition to books, the library also has video cassettes for VHS recorders available for a free three-day check out. These include films for children, classics and general entertainment films. For the traveler, book cassettes are popular and the music-lover has a selection of CD's from which to

choose.

Business services are an important part of the growing collection at Kingwood. Included are Moody's, Value Line, Standard & Poor, Rate O'Gram, Dun and Bradstreet, Wiesenberger Investment, Standard Rate and Data, Thomas Grocery and Product Registers, Wards, as well as many directories.

Subscriptions to various periodicals total 250. In addition, the library has back issues of many reference magazines on Microfiche which can be copied on two Microfiche printers. U.S. phone books are also on Microfiche, as well as college handbooks.

Children's services play an important role at Kingwood where two story hours are held for pre-school children (ages 3-5) on Tuesdays at 10:15 and 2:15. Over 900 children participated in the summer reading program this year. Special events are held throughout the

years.

The Kingwood Library is aided in its work by about 40 volunteers who offer their invaluable services. They perform a variety of tasks, from filing cards, writing orders to calling reserves. Previous library experience is not necessary to join the volunteer program.

Friends Of The Library — Kingwood, a.k.a. as FOLK, supports the Library by fundraisers, including the annual Kingwood Art Show, Used Book sales and Buy-A-Book campaigns. They also solicit the help of volunteers.

The Kingwood Library is one of the busiest in the Harris County system. Librarians assist with reference work in person and by phone. The library is a part of the Interlibrary Loan System.

The library hours are: Mon. 1-9; Tues. 10-6; Wed. 10-9; Thurs. 10-6; Fri. 1-6; and Sat. 10-5. For information about the library call 360-6804.

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# Library supporters brave weather for books

Bundled in their coats and wearing mufflers and mittens, loyal supporters of the Kingwood library braved the unusually cold weather on Saturday to attend the annual Friends of the Library used book sale.

The sale began at 9 a.m. with a special closed-to-the-public exclusive for FOLK members. The crowds were admitted into the sale by 10 a.m. People pushed past each other to take advantage of the prices. There were many takers for the hard bound books priced at 50 cents and the paperbacks at 25 cents. It wasn't long before lines

were forming at the checkout tables.

Each year FOLK sponsors the used book sale. Nancy Matthews, co-chairman, said the sale also serves a social function — it is a time to visit with friends and catch up on news. "This is the place to be on this Saturday," she said, "and other civic groups assist in the endeavor. For the past two years members of the Kingwood Women's Club have volunteered their time to help at the sale. "We couldn't do it without them," said Dorothy Miller, FOLK board member.

In addition to them, the Fellowship of Christian Athletes lend a hand by hauling the books to and from storage

and setting up the display tables.

The money earned from the books sale is used to purchase high demand books for the library. Instead of following the usual buying procedures from the county, the books are purchased directly from wholesalers. Chairman Donna Hudson said this provides the library with almost immediate access to the books.

In addition to the used book sale, the group also sponsors the Buy-a-Book campaign. Christy Whittington, secretary of FOLK, said the benefits from the campaign go into the library gift fund. Approximately \$40,000 including matching funds, was raised from last year's sale. The money was

used to purchase additions to the juvenile collection in non-fiction.

FOLK is comprised of about 100 members interested in books and libraries. In the past the group has contributed to the large and varied selection of books found at the Kingwood library.

"The first book sale earned \$33, then \$300 and last year earned approximately \$1,400," Matthews said. Community response to the various FOLK programs is exceptional. FOLK looks to the community for support. Book donations for the sale are accepted throughout the year.

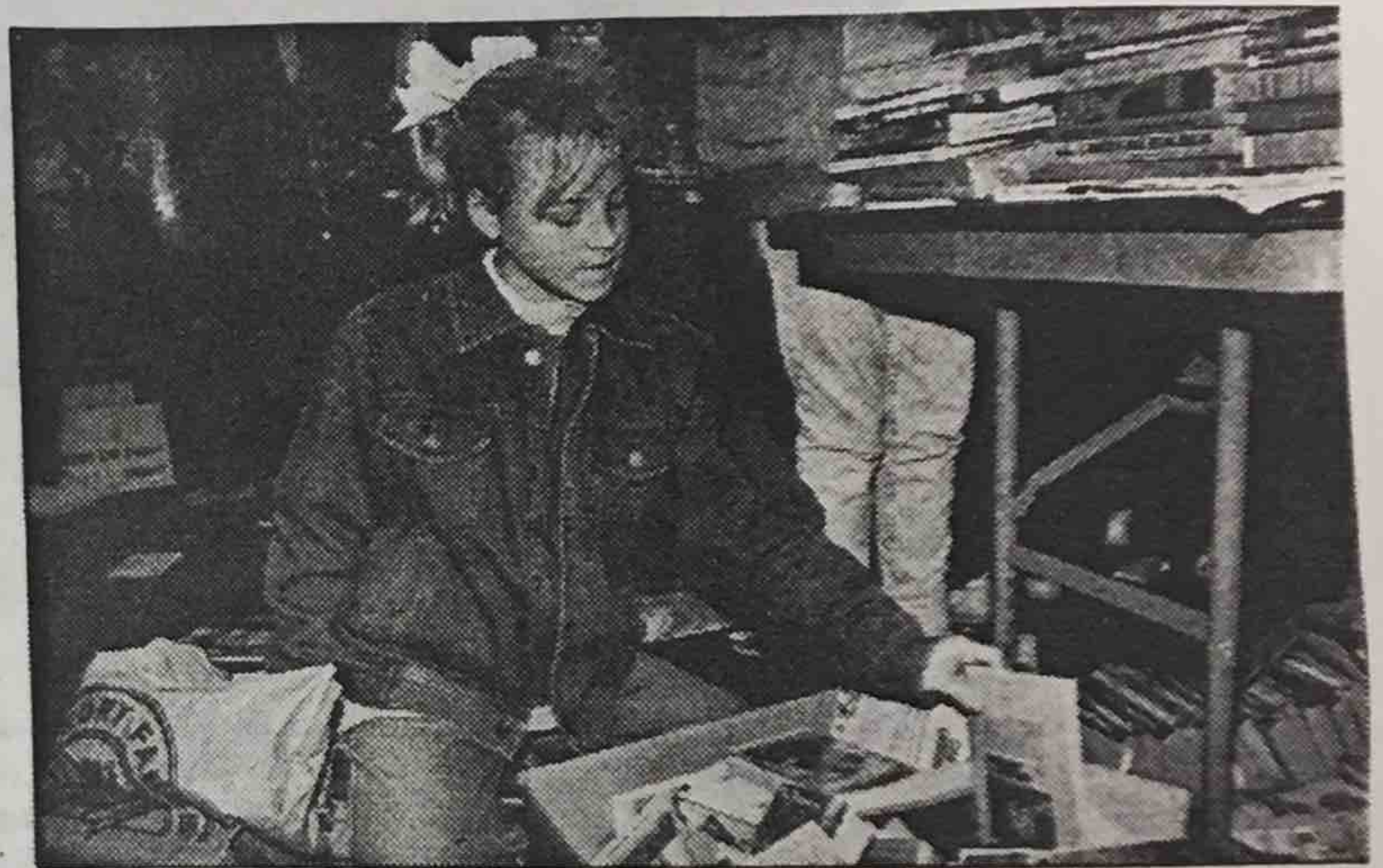

## Library sponsors travel

If your thoughts have been drifting towards the warm sun, sandy beaches and gentle waves, Glenna Henderson of Focus Travel would have fulfilled your daydreams at her travel seminar last week.

Kingwood library was the setting for a "What's New in Travel" presentation. The discussion was centered on the best ways to obtain reduced travel fares and the "hottest" areas for the summer.

"Although fares are steadily rising, it is the businessman, not the leisure traveler, who is absorbing the highest costs," said Henderson.

"There has been greater stability in the airline industry in the last year. This is a welcome relief from the rollercoaster fares following deregulation."

Even though generally higher, good fares can still be obtained by booking travel well in advance. Tickets reserved at least 21 days prior to travel are the best values in today's market. Price reductions are also available on

trips booked 14 and seven days in advance.

For those cost-conscious, advance planners, the best places to investigate now are Hawaii, Jamaica and Belize. Of course, Ixtapa and Puerto Vallarta are still favorite vacation spots in Mexico.

But, new on the scene and considered the rising star of Mexican tourist attractions is Hautulco, which is located on the pacific side.

Hawaiian travel is a good buy. Fares are running approximately \$560 per person, round trip during off-peak travel times.

"Jamaica is nice if you stay in the tourist areas," said Henderson. "It's beautiful and mountainous." Although still recovering from Hurricane Gilbert, there should be package deals available in May when Continental Airlines begins flying to Jamaica via Miami.

Belize, formerly the British Honduras, is a very laid-back, casual beach resort. Visitors have the option of a regular resort hotel or thatch-roof

# Violinist performs at FOLK Gala

A violin virtuoso and scholar, Trung Le Trinh, is one of the featured artists at the "Spring Musical Gala" to be held on April 8 at the Grand Ballroom of the Houston Airport Marriott. The concert is presented by Kingwood Music Studios in cooperation with FOLK, and proceeds will benefit the Kingwood Public Library.

Trung left a flourishing career in Vietnam as a concert violinist on stage and television when he moved to the U. S. in 1975. But his genius as a musician did not go unnoticed in his adopted country, especially at the New England Conservatory of Music in Boston where he finished his Master of Music with honors in 1983. While finishing his graduate

studies, he won other scholarships at music festivals including the prestigious Evian Music Festival in France, Round Top International Music Festival and Tanglewood Music Center Festival in Massachusetts.

In 1979, Trung debuted at Carnegie Hall with the Apple Hill Chamber Players. He has since performed with several orchestras that included the Rhode Island Philharmonic, Boston Classical Orchestra and the Boston Pops Orchestra. Currently, he is a member of the Houston Symphony, the Houston Pops Orchestra and assistant principal with the Houston Ballet Orchestra. He is also in great demand as a featured soloist at various recitals and concerts in the U.S. and Canada. In spite of his busy schedule, he finds time to teach violin at Kingwood Music Studios, fulfilling what he calls an "obligation to share my talent with young people."

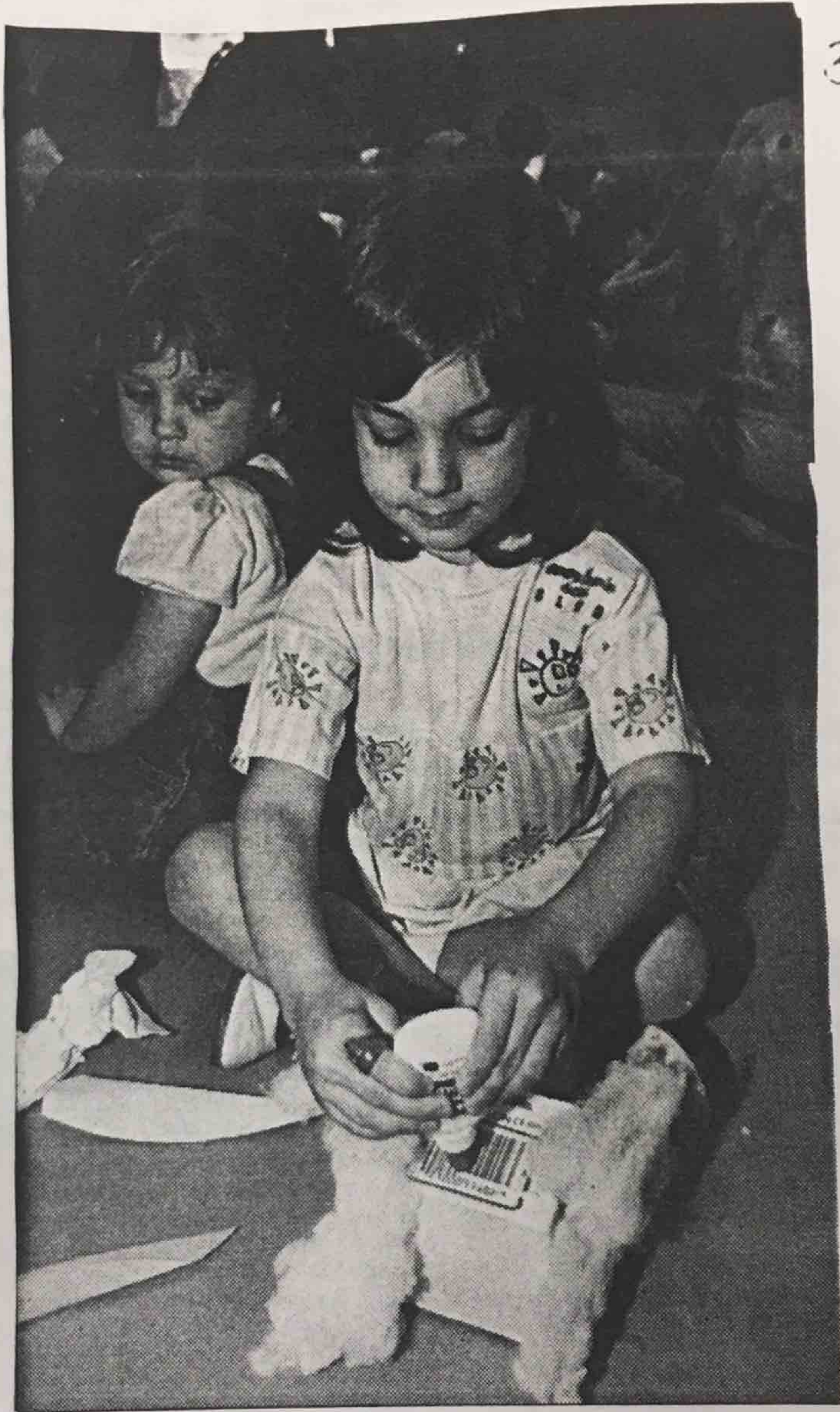

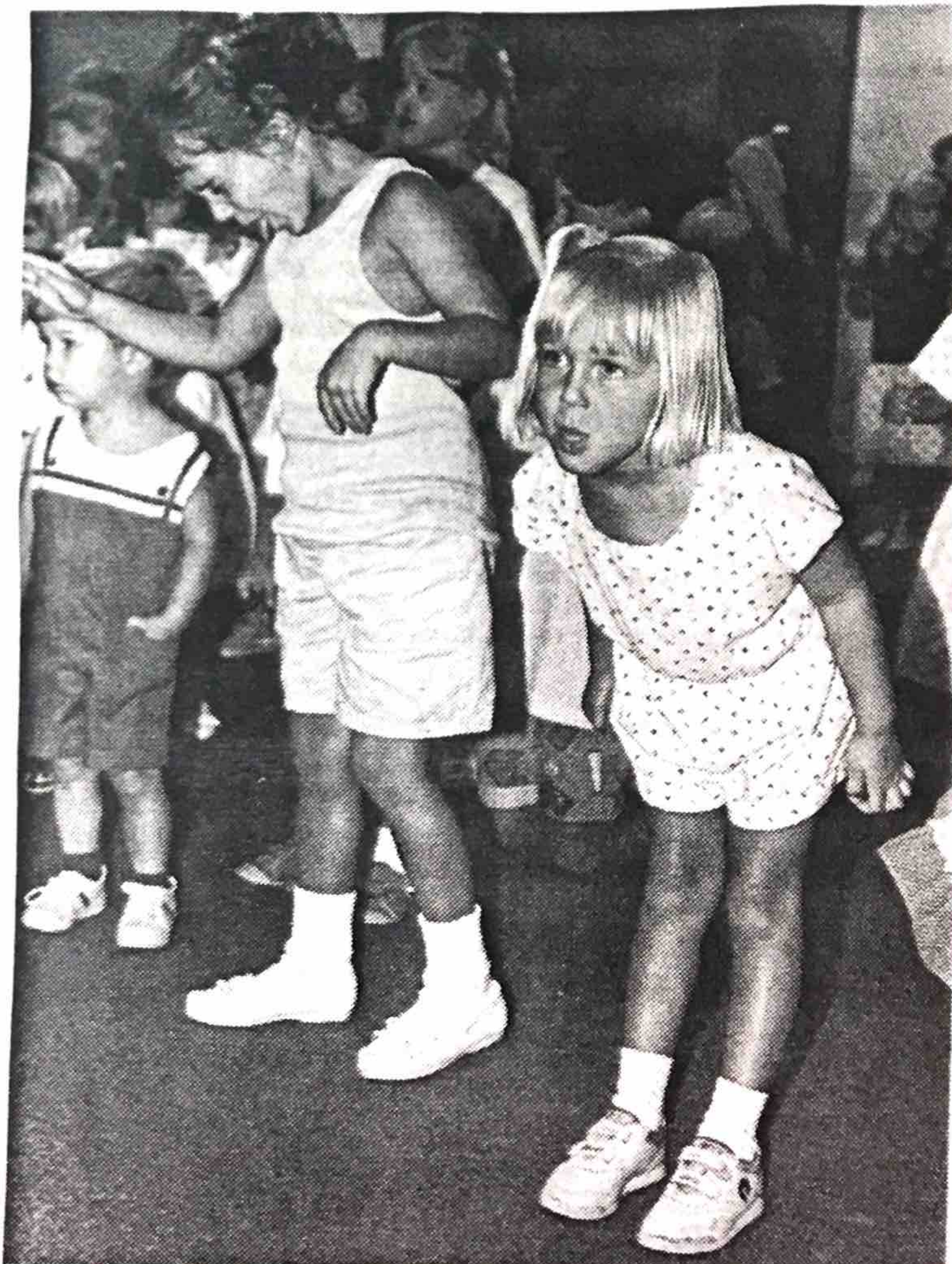

Libraries are about books, and books are about words, but there are also some interesting numbers associated with the Kingwood Branch Library.

It is not the largest branch in the Harris County system, but it circulates more books each month than any other branch. In June, 6,000 books were checked out to some of the 13,700 cardholders. This represents an increase of 1500 books more than the number of books checked out in June of 1988. Over 115,000 books have been circulated this year.

The Kingwood branch houses 2,152 volumes of reserve and cir-

culating books and 73,449 non-book items such as audio and video tapes, records, magazines, and the microfiche collection which includes magazines, telephone books of U.S. cities, and college catalogs of every major college in the U.S.

Kingwood conducts a most successful program series. Almost 1100 people have attended 12 special programs presented this year.

How many people staff this popular branch library? There are four librarians, four desk assistants, one custodian, one part-time shelver, and about 40 volunteers. FOLK is over 70 members strong.

Library hours are: Monday, 1-9; Tuesday, 10-6; Wednesday, 10-9; Thursday, 10-6; Friday, 1-6; Saturday, 10-5.

**BOOK REVIEWS** are welcome from adults and children on fiction, non-fiction, new books and old favorites. To submit a review include your name, grade if in school, name of the book, the author, and a few lines about the book. Turn in reviews at the library.

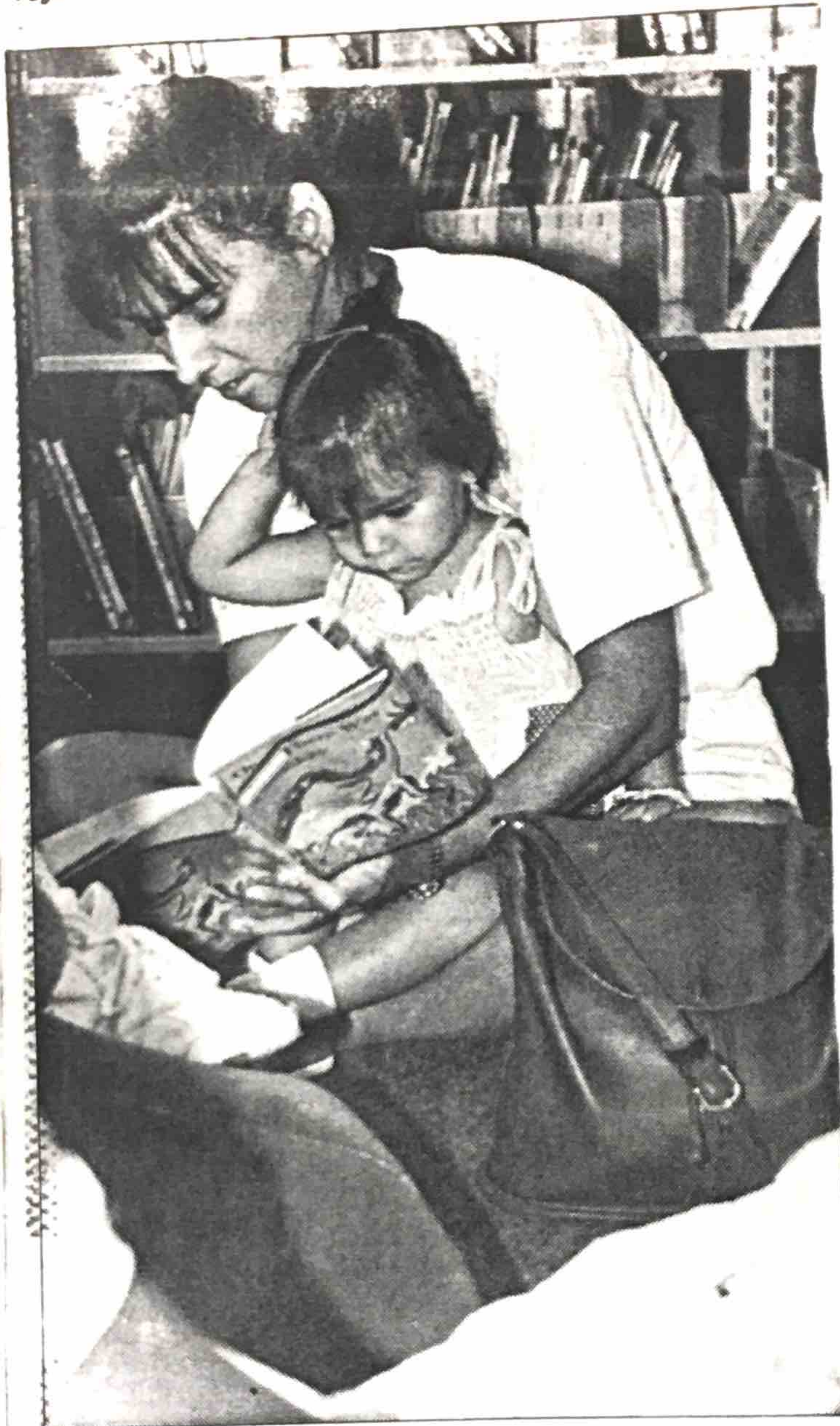

The Kingwood Branch Library is one of 23 branches of the Harris County Public Library System and is located at 4102 Rustic Woods Drive in the King's Crossing area of Kingwood. It is staffed by four librarians and four desk assistants, a shelver, and a custodian, all anxious to be of service.

Library cards are issued free to county residents with proof of current address. Children under 14 must have their application signed by a parent with proof of a parent's address showing. Most library materials are loaned for a two-week period. Overdue fines for books are two cents a day.

In addition to books, the library also has video cassettes for VHS recorders available for a free three-day check out. These include films for children, classics and general entertainment films. For the traveler, book cassettes are popular and the music-lover has a selection of CD's from which to

choose.

Business services are an important part of the growing collection at Kingwood. Included are Moody's, Value Line, Standard & Poor, Rate O'Gram, Dun and Bradstreet, Wiesenberger Investment, Standard Rate and Data, Thomas Grocery and Product Registers, Wards, as well as many directories.

Subscriptions to various periodicals total 250. In addition, the library has back issues of many reference magazines on Microfiche which can be copied on two Microfiche printers. U.S. phone books are also on Microfiche, as well as college handbooks.

Children's services play an important role at Kingwood where two story hours are held for pre-school children (ages 3-5) on Tuesdays at 10:15 and 2:15. Over 900 children participated in the summer reading program this year. Special events are held throughout the

years.

The Kingwood Library is aided in its work by about 40 volunteers who offer their invaluable services. They perform a variety of tasks, from filing cards, writing orders to calling reserves. Previous library experience is not necessary to join the volunteer program.

Friends Of The Library — Kingwood, a.k.a. as FOLK, supports the Library by fundraisers, including the annual Kingwood Art Show, Used Book sales and Buy-A-Book campaigns. They also solicit the help of volunteers.

The Kingwood Library is one of the busiest in the Harris County system. Librarians assist with reference work in person and by phone. The library is a part of the Interlibrary Loan System.

The library hours are: Mon. 1-9; Tues. 10-6; Wed. 10-9; Thurs. 10-6; Fri. 1-6; and Sat. 10-5. For information about the library call 360-6804.

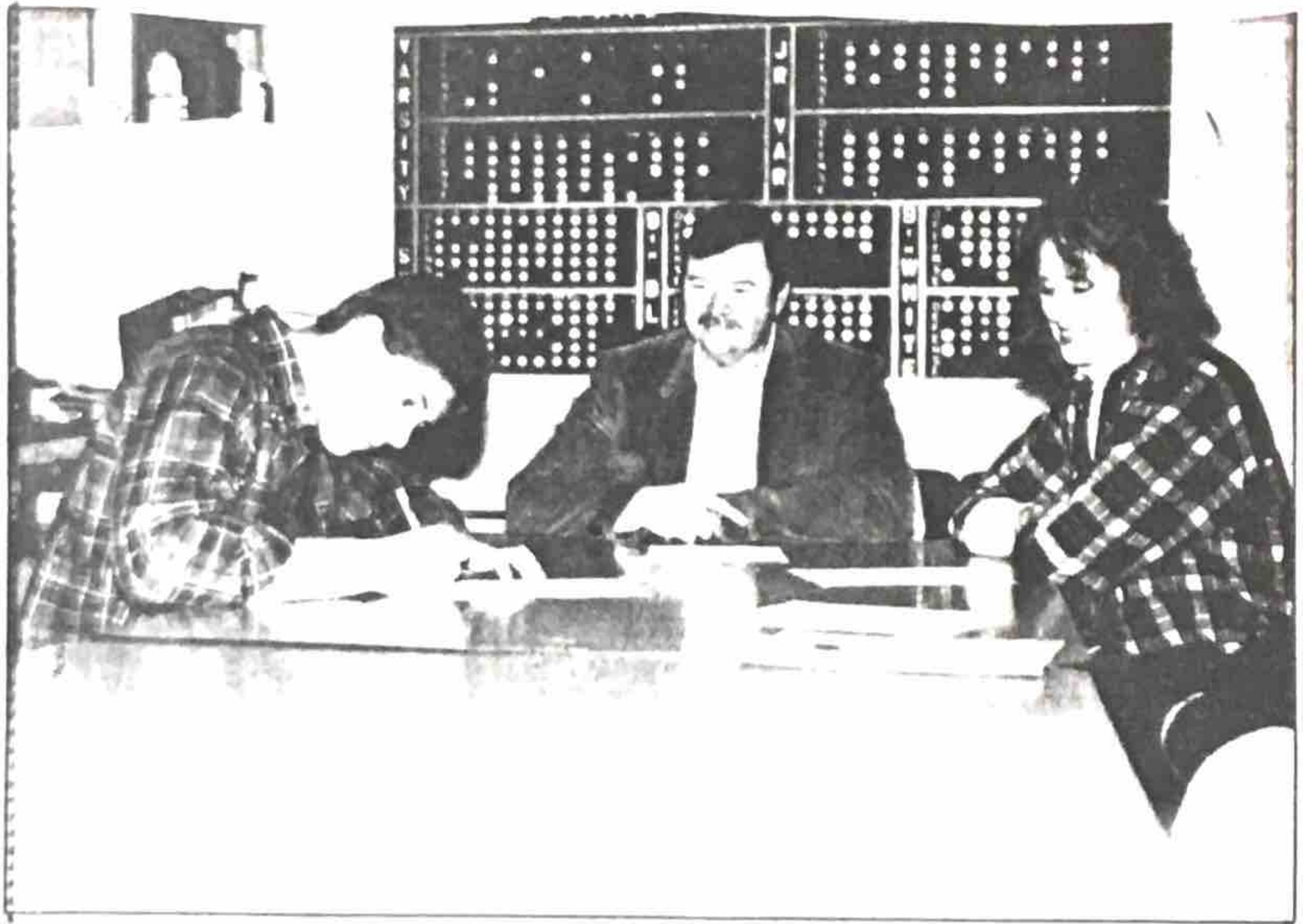

KINGWOOD — While other area high school athletes look to escape the traps of the Southwest Conference, Kingwood Mike Ecklund was set on giving the SWC a try.

Ecklund signed a letter of intent to play football with the Rice Owls on Wednesday. The 6'3" senior offensive lineman is expected to make to the defensive side of the ball with the Owls.

"I preferred to stay in the SWC and in the state," Ecklund said. "I had considered (going out of state) but I decided to stay in the state."

Ecklund, who earned first-team

all-district honors at the offensive line position, considered offers from TCU and West Point before selecting Rice.

"I chose Rice because of the team," Ecklund said. "The program's on the way up and also for the strong academic tradition they have at the school."

Also catching Ecklund's eye was the fact that Rice is considered one of the upcoming programs in the SWC. Last year, Rice posted conference victories over SMU and Baylor in ending a school-record district losing streak.

"I just liked Rice's strong academics," Ecklund said. "They are a team that hasn't got a lot of

recognition but if you look at them now, they have a lot of people coming back and they're on their way up."

The senior tackle at Kingwood noted that he didn't start thinking about a football scholarship until the beginning of this season. "At the end of last year I started getting letters but it really didn't hit me at the time," Ecklund said. "I just didn't think about it."

But a strong senior season caught the attention of Rice Head Football Coach Fred Goldsmith and as soon as recruiting season began, Ecklund pledged verbally to Rice.

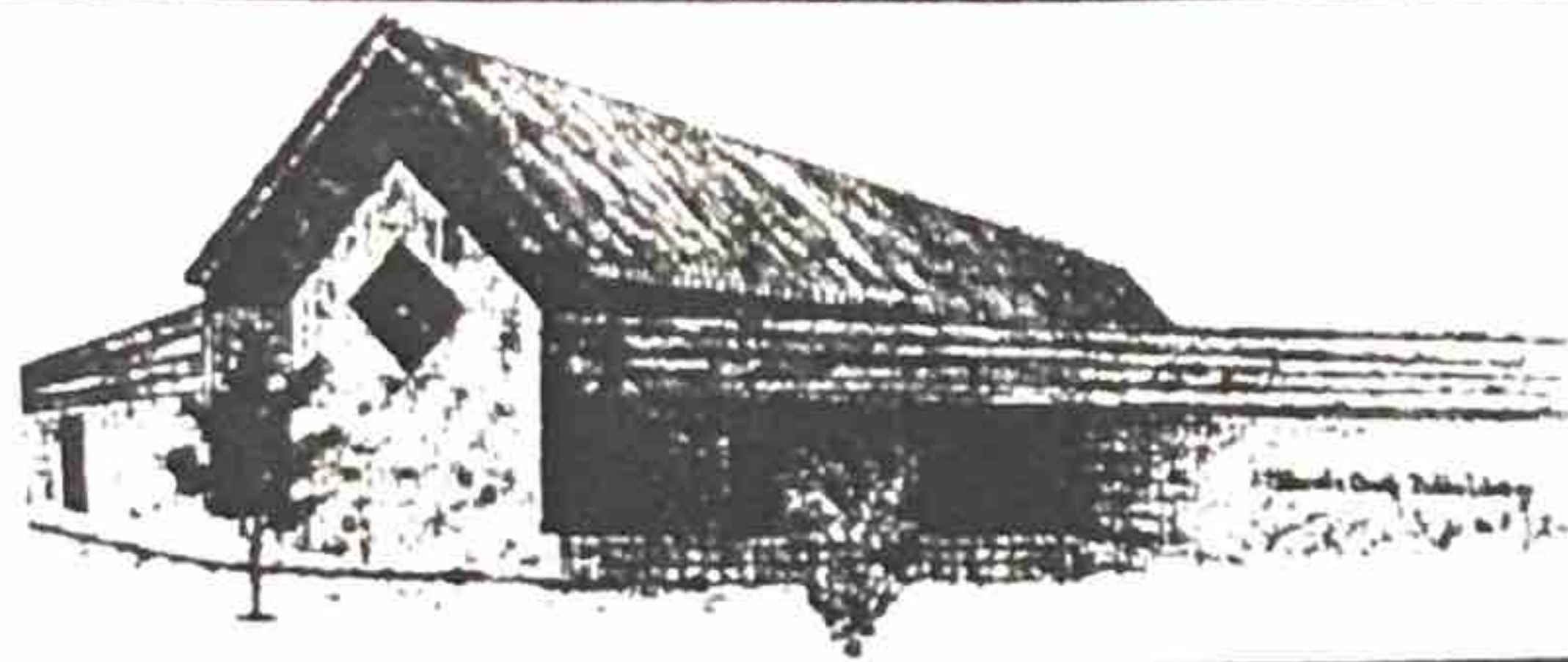

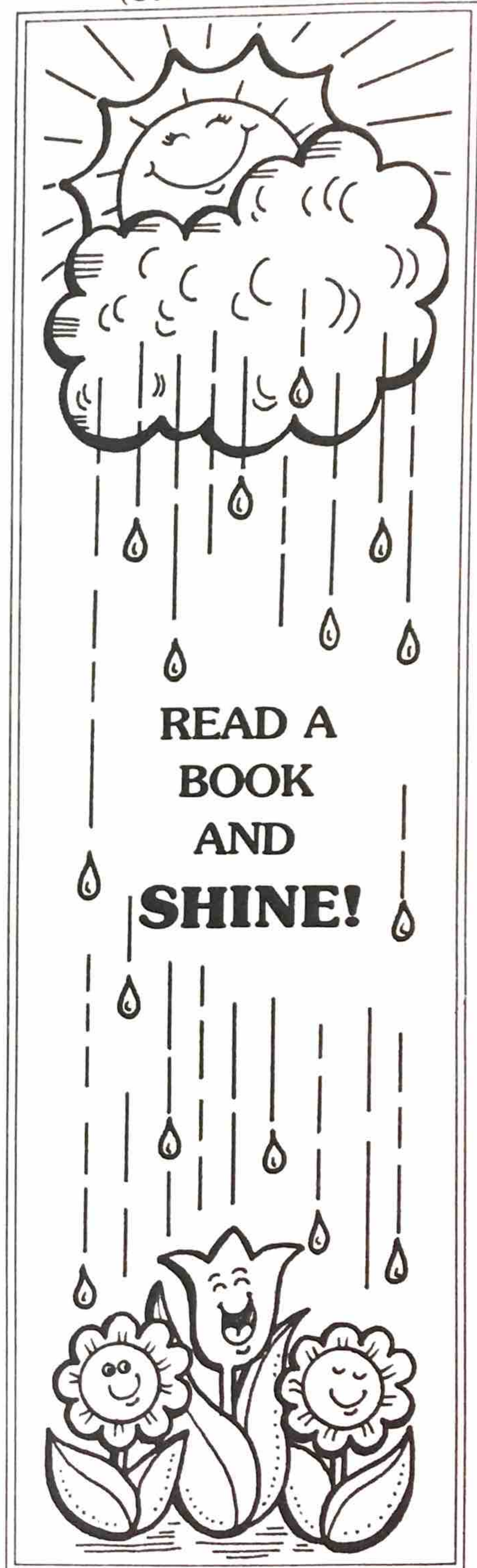

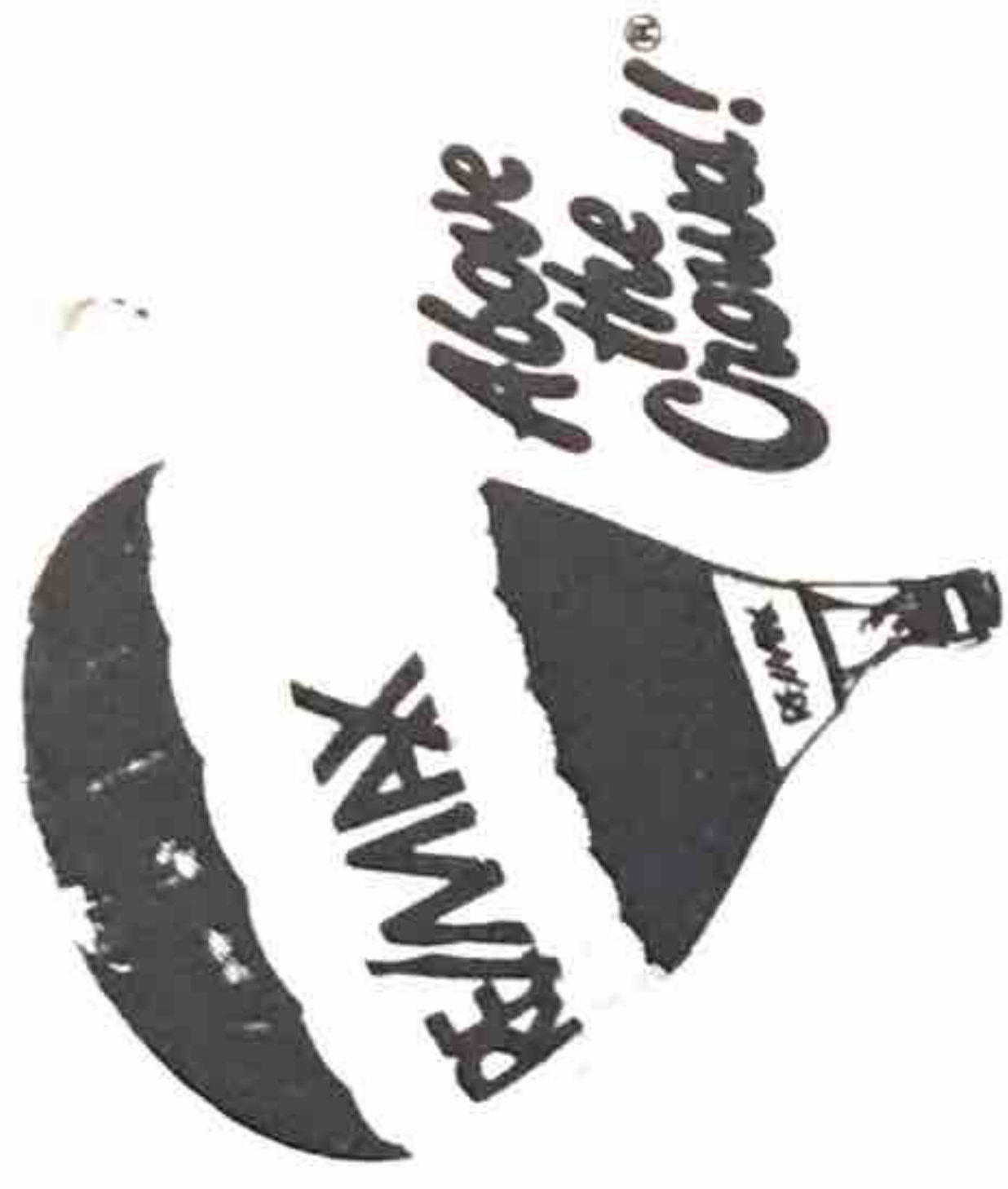

- *Homecoming*. Bob Greene. Non-fiction. This book gives a searing look at what really happened to American soldiers when they came home from the country's most controversial war, told by the veterans themselves.
- *Kareem*. Kareem Abdul-Jabbar. Non-fiction. This book is a memoir in the form of a diary of the Los Angeles Laker's last season in 1989.
- *Legacies: A Chinese Mosaic*. Bette Bao Lord. Non-fiction. Lord, a Chinese woman raised in the United States, tells her own story and those of her clansmen and others. They bear witness to the surreal realities of revolutionary China — a society where one day's solid ground may well be the next day's quicksand — and to the astonishing resilience, humor and heroic equanimity of the Chinese spirit. The work culminates in the brave and tragic drama of the "China Spring" of 1989.
- *The Hundred Yard Lie*. Rick Telander. Non-fiction. The lead college writer for *Sports Illustrated* points out the unbelievable corruption and hypocrisy in college football today and offers a modest proposal for cleaning it up.

- *Damned Yankees*. Moss Klein and Bill Madden. Non-fiction. This book gives a firsthand, behind-the-scenes account of how chaos, confusion and craziness pervaded the once proud and mighty New York Yankee franchise and doomed it to a decade of decay.
- *Population Explosion*. Anne H. Ehrlich and Paul R. Ehrlich. Non-fiction. From global warming to rain forest destruction, famine and air and water pollution, this book tells why overpopulation is our number one environmental problem.

Set in the 1950s and 1960s, this book tells of the lives and struggles of two families, one white and one black: like mirror images of each other, and of the country in which they live, each moves from a time of high promise to an age of embittered violence.
- *Friend of My Youth*. Alice Munro. Fiction. This book is Munro's richest collection. It tells ten magnificent stories.
- *A Time of War*. Michael Peterson. Fiction. President Johnson sends Bradley Marshall to Viet Nam to find the critical information that will allow LBJ to overrule General Westmoreland and his advisors and start withdrawing American troops. Marshall is a can-do idealist heading into a deadly labyrinth.
- *September*. Rosamunde Pilcher. Fiction. A group of diverse characters are brought together to the little Scottish town of Strathcroy for a 21st birthday party. They find fate has surprising destinies in store for them.

■ *Lazarus*. Morris West. Fiction. The Pope is faced with death on two fronts: by terrorist assassination and from cardiac disease. Pope Leo XIV has been an ironfisted reactionary, crushing dissent and progressivism at every turn. His brush with mortality makes him aware of the need for tolerance and humility. ## Trailer — has history, will travel

*A Texas Experience*, a 40-foot long, 8-foot wide trailer which recently visited the Harris County Kingwood Branch Library, is not only a step back into time figuratively but literally.

Relying heavily on sensual perception, Texas exhibits are hands-on-type antiquities and

replicas bought by the museum's founder and curator, Dayton Denton. When people use their senses to learn, they tend to retain more, he said.

The traveling museum is making its way around the Harris County Public Library branches this summer as part of the system's reading program. During the fall, the traveling exhibit, which is open to the public, visits

schools.

"This takes the students past education and into the museum setting," Denton said. "Educationally, the museum enhances what the teachers have taught students in Texas history classes. It is like a three-dimensional textbook. This gives kids more reality."

The museum, while target-

# Texas trailer has unique history

ing fourth- and seventh-grade Texas history students, can capture the attention of kindergartners as well as adults, he said. It takes about 15 minutes to view the items in the museum — all of which are “touchable,” he said.

The museum is divided into eight parts, with each telling a bit of Texas history. A section on the six flags details Texas' early founding by first the Spanish, then the French, Mexican and United States, before becoming the Republic of Texas during the Civil War, then reverting to U.S. ownership. Other sections include, agriculture, immigration and ethnic groups, space, western frontier, industrial Texas, today's Texas and time line.

The trailer, unveiled Nov. 17, 1989, is part of a non-profit foundation, Mobile Museums of Texas. It has visited 219 schools in 35 school districts and more than 38,000 students have passed through the museum, sponsored by Pepsi Cola South. Children push, punch and run their fingers over maps and buttons as well as dress in vintage and ethnic costumes via a projected image.

“There is a magic mirror in the exhibit. It is the only one like it in the United States,” he said. “The mirror was built in France for use by fashion designers. The mirror illuminates a child's face and allows the child to see what he looks like in various costumes.

This is part of the immigration and ethnic group exhibit.”

Native Texan Willie Nelson plays a part in *A Texas Experience* via a recorded taped version of Texas history and folk songs in which Nelson reads a letter written by Col. William B. Travis from the ill-fated Alamo. There also are prints of pictures and paintings pertaining to Texas history. These are from the Institute of Texan Cultures in San Antonio.

A video tape tells about Texas tidbit facts and a 4-foot hands-on relief map allows students to touch and feel different regions in Texas — such as mountainous areas. Yet another map of Texas lights up and has sliding panels: It gives a listing of the agricultural and industrial products produced in the state's regions.

“For example, if a student selects wheat. A panel slides back and there is wheat stalk and a box of corn flake cereal. A pushed button lights up a shadow box, which shows the type of produce grown in that region,” he said. “The coastal region in which live would be rice, sugar or citrus.”

One exhibit focuses on the Texas western frontier. Visitors may walk along a dirt street through a miniature replica of a rustic town. The street is replete with wagon wheel tracks, horse hoof prints and foot steps created by “cowboys.”

The traveling museum is a new

concept in education. This allows the museum to come to the schools, so students do not have to miss class.

“I've also found that the hard-to-reach students, whose attention span is short, are the ones who linger over the exhibits the longest,” Denton said.

The museum has several more stops at various branch libraries before the school season begins. Other scheduled stops include:

# Talk on long-term health coverage set at Botcher

A two-hour program on choosing long-term health care insurance will be presented Sept. 20 at 10 a.m. at Baldwin Botcher Branch Library and at 7 p.m. on Sept. 24 at the Kinewood Branch Library by Scott Truesdell of the Amex Life Assurance Company.

According to Truesdell, there are about 120 companies in the long-term health care insurance business, but only about six have actually paid any benefits. Truesdell said two most common

reasons given for failure to pay claims include restriction for "medical necessity" and "post claim underwriting."

He said the problem encountered in the "medical necessity" restriction is "who is to determine what a 'medical necessity' is and what does 'medical necessity' mean? If the insurance company has complete control of what 'medical necessity' means and who can certify to that situation, the insured probably cannot expect to see any benefits paid."

When a company is involved in "post claim underwriting," the applicant is asked to fill in a complete

medical history from their own records and memory. After receiving the application and the first premiums, the company issues a "certificate of insurance." That "certificate" is not the same thing as a policy. After a claim is received the company investigates the medical record of the insured. If there is even the most trivial variation in what the insured reported earlier and any documented medical history, the company may claim fraud and refuse to pay the claim, according to Truesdell.

In his presentation Truesdell gives 11 questions to which a person should be able to answer "yes" be-

fore he or she can be reasonably sure that long-term care insurance will be of any value. These questions are:

1. Can you go to the care facility without first being in the hospital or other level of care?
  2. If it is necessary, can you go directly to intermediate or custodial care without first requiring skilled care?
  3. Does the policy pay enough to cover the costs you cannot pay out of your own income for all three levels of care now and in the future?
  4. Will the premiums remain the same as you get older or as your health deteriorates?
  5. Is the policy valid in another state?
  6. Does the policy pay benefits whether or not you have other insurance?
  7. Will the policy pay benefits if you develop Alzheimer's disease or any other form of senility after you have taken it out?
  8. Can you renew as long as you pay the premiums on time?
  9. Can you afford to pay the deductible period without seriously depleting your savings and other assets?
  10. Can you afford the premiums out of all your sources of income without seriously impairing your or your spouse's standard of living?
  11. Does the company underwrite your application based on your medical records at the time of application?
- Truesdell will discuss these issues at the sessions. People may want to consult with a relative or friend when shopping for long-term care insurance or ask them to also attend a session.
